Wee Neighbors Are Making a Big Difference

An adult African Elephant weighs about 10,000 pounds. That is less than the weight of the cereal donated by children to this year's Wee Carel Cereal Drive. Sixty-two elementary schools and preschools across Forsyth County participated in the Wee Carel Cereal Drive. They donated an incredible 11,278 boxes of cereal, at a total weight of 11,574 pounds.

According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, the cost of cereal has gone up 14.2% in the past year. Pre-pandemic, in 2019, the average cost of a box of cereal was \$3.27. Currently the average price of a box of cereal is \$6.00, making the retail value of this year's Wee Care! Cereal Drive nearly \$68,000.

It is heart-warming to see young children give boxes of their favorite cereal to help families in need of food assistance. The Wee Carel Cereal Drive helps children learn about giving to help others. Their generous donations prove that while they may be small, these children have big hearts!

Crisis Control Ministry Volunteers Win the Forsyth County Volunteer Governor's Award

The room was full of inspirational volunteers from across the county who had been nominated for awards by local nonprofits. Crisis Control Ministry's very own volunteers, the Attic Ladies, and their families, were in the room.

For those of you who are wondering who the Attic Ladies are, let me tell you about three phenomenal women dedicated to assisting neighbors in crises by sharing their time and talent with Crisis Control. Debbie Newell, Wanda Motsinger, and Jayne Danner are exceptional volunteers. These ladies run a consignment program to fundraise for the Kernersville Office. Their nickname of the Attic Ladies came from their ability to creatively utilize the attic space at the Kernersville office to store and sort donations for the consignment program. They helped build the consignment program back in 2016 and continue to strengthen the program. They enjoy and take pride in turning one person's trash into another person's treasure.

Throughout the Kernersville consignment community, they are well known. Every week they sort through donations, price items to sell, and display items at the Crisis Control Ministry booth and bookshelves located in two consignment shops in town. Unique Treasures and Collectibles and Cooper's Vintage Village. Often, these consignment shops won't charge a rental fee to Crisis Control Ministry because of the relationship these ladies have built with the business owners. Other vendors in the shops will also donate items that won't sell in their booths to the ladies because they know the ladies can sell them. to see the weekly inventory they sell at the shops. You'll find new or gently used clothing, accessories, jewelry, household items, collectibles, decorations, sporting equipment, and more.

Because of the incredible work of the Attic Ladies,

Crisis Control Ministry's Kernersville Office has additional funding to assist neighbors. Their impact is enormous. In 2022 alone they raised \$14,662.98 for neighbors experiencing crises in the Kernersville community, which is 6% of the total revenue for the Kernersville Office. We are grateful to these amazing women and all that they do for the organization and the people in their community who are in crisis.

I'm proud to say that during Crisis Control Ministry's 50th Anniversary year, the Attic Ladies won the NC Governor's Volunteer Service Award for the volunteer team category. School is Out for Summer

Help us feed families who are facing food insecurity.

Carefree summer days—most of us have fond memories of summer vacation from school. But for many families with school-age children, those months can present greater challenges. In 2021, according to Feeding America, 16.8% of children in Forsyth County and 16.4% in Stokes County were food insecure. That is more than 16,000 children right here in our community. These families often depend on the free and reduced school meal programs to feed their children nutritious meals. At CCM, we typically see an increase in the need for food assistance during

the summer months, but due to high inflation this summer we expect the need will be greater. According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index Inflation Calculator, \$100 in April of 2020 is now only worth \$85.52 in April of 2023.

Our food pantries are already feeling the impact. There are many ways you can help. You can host a food drive or make a financial donation. For more information about how you can help, visit crisiscontrol.org.
